# **Becoming Channels of Compassion**

The new academic year is at our doorstep. Together with the refreshing monsoon we look forward to infuse new energy and enthusiasm into what we will be doing. We all are engaged in some kind of ministry, be it working with children, women, senior citizens or visiting families. As we work a number of years, routine sets in and one tends to ask how to bring tremendous sense of vitality, energy and enthusiasm in our ministry? What will bring quality in our services? We may think it is basic skills, higher training, expertise, knowledge or having expensive equipment which may contribute to quality. Sometimes we think quality comes with better facilities, techniques, good infrastructure or conducive atmosphere. While all these are necessary, and adds to efficiency in our services, may not bring about the required quality. The essential virtue that make our services qualitatively different is compassion. All faiths insist that compassion is the test of true spirituality and that it brings us into relation with the transcendence, we call God. Compassion is a virtue that flows into us when there is deep communion with God. When we are in communion with God, His compassion flows into us and we become instruments to flow His compassion to others. For us Jesus was the epiphany and embodiment of compassion and this virtue is the central ethic of Jesus' enterprise. Compassion should be a state of virtue in all of us. To make our services and offerings qualitatively different, we need:

**To surrender self-seeking projects** that throw away kindness and compassion. When we are mindlessly bothered about fulfilment of all our gratifications, success and climbing the ladder up, we tend to forget the less privileged ones, and some time end up stamping the feet of the other. There compassion and love cannot thrive. We need to get rid of I, me and myself culture.

**Practise non judgement**: To have that ability to look at people and events without labels, prejudices and images because judgement is the nature of the egoistic mind. We need to see things as they are.

**Being conscious of suffering humanity**: So often we look at the beautiful and avoid bad. We don't want to look at the suffering people. A visit to slums, hospitals, orphanages, palliative care centres and homes for differently abled can give us tremendous sense of suffering around us.

**Doing deeds of compassion**: Feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, visiting friends and neighbours are some of the deeds of compassion that all of us can easily perform. To do service, one need not be a doctor or a social worker. All what matters is what you do and how you do it. Let us strive to infuse our services with quality and grace.

# **Training Program for Muslim Women**

Ms. Qutub Jahan Kidwari from Institute of Islamic studies, Santacruz, conducted a special training programme for three days for 35 women leaders of Muslim community and 6 potential leaders of other communities of Jerimeri, Mumbai on the topic of women's status according to Quran.

The training was so interesting that the participants were not at all keen in going back home though it was two and half hour training session on each day. Jagruti Kendra had taken a special initiative to organise this training with all the facilities provided including refreshments and resource person, Ms. Qutub of Institute of Islamic studies on  $4^{\mbox{\tiny th}}$  and  $5^{\mbox{\tiny th}}$  May 2016.

The resource person has been to most of the Muslim countries and knows the real situation of the women in each country. She dealt with shariyat Law in detail and empowered the women with knowledge which is useful for their family and marital life. Since the sessions were very much pertaining to their life situation and the issues confronting them, there was a great participation from the women. They were very much at home with the trainer who made personal contact with each one. As a follow up of this training a group of 15 potential leaders were selected for a Training of Trainers (TOT) who will impart the same knowledge to rest of the women of the Muslim Community.

## SHM Kripa Academy for Skills (KAS)

The goal of Kripa Academy for skills training centre at Shraddha Vihar- Andheri is to equip drop out girls and young women with various skills in the process of empowerment and self-reliance. During past six years the centre has trained 250 young girls who have successfully completed the program which enabled them to earn a decent living. Many of the students noted that through the course they gained a sense of self-worth and independence. They also felt that the skills and confidence they gained would enable them to earn a living and support their families. In the past years the Para Medical exams were conducted under modular employable skills, through Central Government testing centre.

It says that our thinking, doing and feeling are inter connected, our past/childhood has great impact on us, but we can make a great change. We have learned in details different theories, REBT (Rational Emotive Behaviour Therapy) and CHOICE Theory and also had many practical sessions. The major goal of therapy is to reduce or eliminate distressing consequences, minimize anxiety and anger. We were 13 participants. I am very grateful to Sr. Stella and her team for giving me this opportunity to attend the course. It has changed my outlook towards persons

#### PLACE OF COMPASSION & HOPE

I am Rio, at the age of 17, I left my home, a broken family and lived in temporary shelters where I worked. For a span of nearly 25 years I faced a drug problem which kept me hopelessly addicted and living on the streets of Mumbai.



Abandoned, rejected and isolated, I would often prayed to God, attend Church whenever I could, sitting one corner, feeling like a stranger. As I grew in age with lots of attempts and

struggles I finally manage to get out of my addiction. But still had to cope with rough life on the streets. Things got worse, five years later after coming across with an accident which resulted in the amputation of my left leg and I was walking on an prosthetic leg. The pain and depression on this incident almost took me back to my addiction. And only the grace of God helped me not to take the escape route again. I only silently prayed with no blaming or complaining. Receiving gratefully whatever financial help I got from a few good friends, I had made along the way. Finally it was through one of these friends I was brought to Jivan Asha, Andheri in the care of the Helpers of Mary, a home for the aged and destitute like me. I have no words to explain the experience of God's tremendous love for me through the care and concern of these sisters whom God has entrusted me to. I sincerely ask God to bless all those who are and who will come here to devotedly serve the poor and needy. I conclude saying that I who felt so unworthy and undeserving when I was brought to this home atlast in the year 2016, the year of mercy became very special and personal in my life where I am experiencing the compassionate love of Father through the sisters in Jivan Asha. Now at the age of 60 I hope to continue to live in the healing love of God.
